EDITORIAL

If We Don't, Then Who Will?

The Bible teaches that Christians are called by the gospel (2 Thess. 2:14). This calling can come about by reading Scriptures or hearing the Message of Christ taught. It becomes effective when acted upon by faith (Rom. 10:17). Faith-only is nothing more than believing facts, such as demons do (Jas. 2:19). Saving faith is an obedient faith to Christ (Cf. Heb. 5:9).

The Bible teaches that Christians are to share the gospel with the world. Jesus came to “call. . . sinners” (Matt. 9:13) to “repent and believe in the gospel” (Mk. 1:15). And after training twelve men who had responded to this message, He gave the great commission in Matthew 28:19-20 and Mark 16:15 to reach the world with the gospel. Some “Christians” do not believe that they have a personal responsibility in obeying this commission, but rather it is either for others or was a first century command only. The second thought would have to dismiss the idea that people are still lost today! The first thought demands an answer to this question: If the great commission is still to be carried out today – and it is – then who is to do it? Or, putting it another way, if the world is going to hear the true gospel message, then who is going to make sure they hear it? The answer is simple, if we - God’s people - will do what the King of kings has commanded of His subjects, then *we* will “Go” or “Send” (Rom. 10:15), make disciples, baptize them, and teach them all things that the Lord taught His first disciples. Additionally, we must understand the principle in Ephesians 4:16 that “the whole body, joined and held together by every joint with which it is equipped, when each part is working properly, makes the body grow.” Does this not also apply to evangelism beyond the local church? Every member of the church has a role to play in fulfilling the great commission, both near and far!

The Bible teaches that Christians are the only ones qualified to carry out the Great Commission. There is a clear plan of salvation spelled out in the New Testament. “Christ died for our sins” (I Cor. 15:3). In order to be saved, we must **Hear the gospel** - (Rom. 10:14); **Believe it** - (Mk. 16:16); **Repent of sin** - (Lk. 13:3; Acts 2:38); **Confess Christ** - (Rom. 10:9-10; Act. 8:37); **Be Baptized** - (Act. 2:38; Mk.16:16); and **Be Faithful until death** - (Rev. 2:10). God’s people have responded to this. God’s people will also teach this to the alien sinner. Question: Can we expect someone who has not done this to teach it? Not a chance. So then, who will? Only the faithful people of God.

When God needed a prophet to preach to Israel, I like what Isaiah said: “Here am I. Send me!” (Isa. 6:8). When Jesus sent His apostles into all the world, they all answered the call except Judas. Will we?

Treating the Body to Reach the Soul



“Treating the Body to Reach the Soul” is a commonly-used phrase associated with Latin American Missions medical campaigns, though the idea is not original with us. This idea originated with our Lord. “And Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and preaching the gospel of the kingdom, and healing every sickness and every disease among the people” (Mt. 9:35). The obvious purpose for Jesus’ miraculous healing was, of course, to confirm His word as divine authority, but Jesus’ healing also shows His understanding and compassion for those experiencing physical suffering. Therefore, because of our desire to follow in the Savior’s footprints, medical mission campaigns are conducted to treat the body in order to reach the soul. Doctors,

dentists, pharmacists, nurses, and other Christian healthcare professionals join together to treat the body, which opens doors for evangelists and teachers to reach the soul with the saving Gospel of Christ.

Over the years we have learned that treating the physical body is truly one of the most effective ways in which to reach the eternal soul of an individual. We often encounter individuals who are extremely prejudiced against the church and religion in general. Often this individual turns his back to any discussion pertaining to his soul. While this reaction may not be as common in Latin America as it is in North America, it is present. But when this person brings his sick child to the medical clinic, and free medical attention is provided, that wall of prejudice often comes crumbling down, thus providing an opportunity to reach his soul.

Healthcare professionals, evangelists, and teachers are ready and willing to work, but we are in need of around \$8,000 in order to purchase the medicine.

The Value of *El Expositor Espiritual* (The Spiritual Expositor)

Back in 1978, we printed our first issue of **El Expositor Bíblico** which later became **El Expositor Espiritual**. I was then working with the 23rd and Grace congregation in Wichita Falls, Texas. Prior to that I was holding gospel meetings all over Latin America, I had been a missionary in Argentina and had taught for nine years at the Sunset School of Preaching.

My family and I then moved to San Antonio, Texas to work with the Randolph Church of Christ where I continued holding gospel meetings, did some local work, continued with **El Expositor Espiritual** and began the translation of **The Gospel Advocate Commentaries**.

Before printing the first copy of **El Expositor Espiritual**, I had tried to get others to work together in this project because brethren throughout Latin America and this country were telling me that we needed a paper like those being done in English. But I had no takers and was told that I was facing two basic obstacles: 1) Having enough writers for the project and 2) financing it. This warning has proven true. I then decided that I would take the bull by the horns and go forward with the help of the brethren. After a quarter of a century, **El Expositor Espiritual** continues. Our first issue, as one publisher put it, was just a glorified bulletin. We went to a professional printer after that and have continued in that manner. While in San Antonio over several years, we were able to get the paper out four times a year.

After arriving in Valdosta in 1999, we have rarely been able to get four issues out in a year. In the last four or five years it has only been one issue a year. The reason for this is a lack of funds.

What results have we seen from El Expositor Espiritual? Beyond our greatest expectations! It has gone throughout the Spanish-speaking world: Latin America, Spain, also to Canada, the United States, Australia, etc. The appreciation expressed has been very encouraging. This has been an additional teaching tool for our school of preaching, along with our lectureships and other efforts.

Everywhere I go for gospel meetings, lectureships or graduations, preachers come to me apologizing for using my sermon outlines or articles in their home congregations or other places. I tell them to use them for the glory of God; and besides, that is why they are printed.

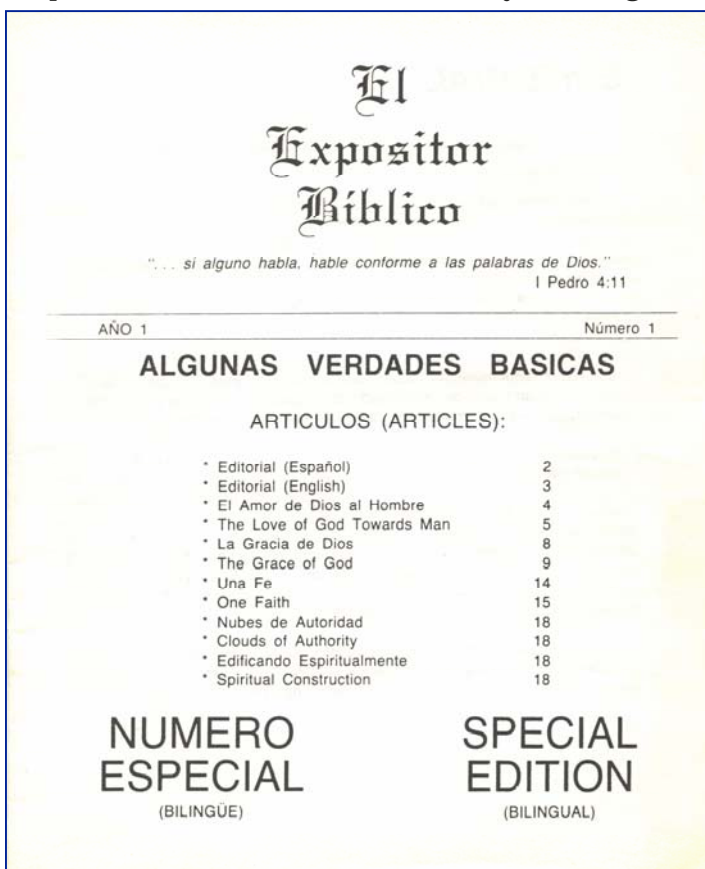
Some of our current preachers tell me that they have been reading and using **El Expositor** since their childhood. And when given the opportunity to have one of their articles published in **EEE**, it made them feel so happy and privileged.

One of those preachers who expressed this is **Daniel Jaramillo**. Daniel is a Colombian graduate from the Bible School of the Americas

Panama campus, who later served as the sub-director of the Medellin, Colombia campus. He is now doing some great missionary work in Argentina by resurrecting a dead congregation to what is now a very active congregation; recently two Pentecostal preachers were converted and a new congregation was established.

Much more could be said on the great results of our quarterly, **El Expositor Espiritual**, but our space is limited here. There is no question that this journal must continue. The question that remains, however, is this: **Could you help us to continue this great tool for the edification of the church that speaks the language of Cervantes?**

Why Support the General Fund?

Latin American Missions, as many of you know, is a multifaceted work. And in order to do all the various works within the program, we solicit help from sister congregations and fellow individual Christians like you.

Children's Home

Brethren will respond to certain specific areas because these may be what they have a passion for or realize is in need at the time, which is good. The question is, what do we do when certain areas of work lack the funds to carry on with regularity? This is where the General Fund comes in.

Relief

If the Children's Home in Panama, for example, has a legitimate need outside the set budget, then we take money from the General Fund to cover it.

As you know, there are several native preachers who receive support through LAM. However, there are times when support comes in late or

even is forgotten, but we send the man/men their money anyway, at least one time. Again, the General Fund will cover this.

Native Preacher Support

We receive a lot of requests for help when preachers, their wives, or other church members need assistance due to sickness, surgeries, etc. We have a Benevolence Fund, but it is not always "funded." We respond by asking the preachers' supporters or people like you for help, but we do not always get all that is needed. So, we go to the General Fund.

We have a budget for the Bible School; but, again, emergencies arise. The General Fund is the source for covering these needs.

Benevolence

All miscellaneous items, such as office supplies, equipment, some (not all) travel, phone bills, etc. are paid from the General Fund.

But here is the bigger question: What do we do if the General Fund is low? We make choices and pay what is necessary; the other things go begging.

Miscellaneous

Helping the General Fund may not be as exciting as, say, buying Bibles or supporting a preacher, but Latin American Missions cannot operate without it. No organization can. The Forrest Park church puts a substantial amount of money into this Fund, but we cannot cover it all.

Bible School of the Americas

Please think about this article carefully and prayerfully and consider helping the General Fund one time, or, even better, on a monthly basis.

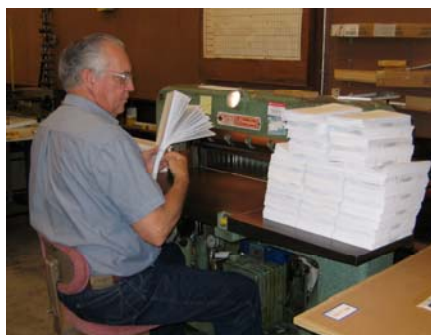
The Gospel Advocate Commentary on Luke is currently being bound. We printed 1,000 copies.

The Cost of Church Growth

Many of us have heard prayers stating something like, “Lord bless this congregation and bless us with spiritual and numeric growth.” But, what is entailed in calling for growth?

Are we asking God to do our part or are we asking God to bless us as we go out into this lost world and preach the Gospel? Christ told us in Matthew 28:19-20: “Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age. Amen.” When we accomplish the first command of going out and making disciples, we strengthen ourselves as we teach. We also have an effect on those who go with us as we teach. I think of Timothy as he traveled with Paul. Can you imagine what it was like hearing those great Gospel lessons first hand? Can we help some new “Timothy” today by bringing him or her with us as we visit those who need to hear the Gospel for the first time and those who also need to hear it anew?

Now, as we teach the Gospel it should also result in numerical growth. This answers the prayer we asked God to be involved in, but it may cause other challenge. We need to go to God for help, again. The new challenge is, where do we place all these new members of the Lord’s church when they outgrow their existing facilities? This is often the difficulty we face in Latin America as we plant new congregations.

There are but two real choices for congregations in Latin America: either rent or build. Renting is usually the first course of action that is available. The congregation is small

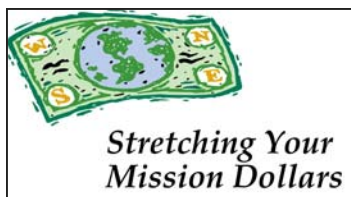
and a small space can often be found. The problem sometimes is that rent can go up at a faster rate than the local work can afford, thus causing a need for other Christians to help in this burden.

The other course of action could be to buy some land and build a church building for the local work. This too can vary a great deal in expense, depending on the location of the congregation. In Honduras this past year I checked into land prices at two different places. One was in the small, poor town of Villa San Francisco, where a piece of property was for sale that cost approximately \$8,000.00. The other property was located in La Esperanza, an area where foreigners go for vacation. Because there is such a high demand for land in this area, the prices for lots are approximately \$100,000.00. These prices are far out of the reach of both congregations mentioned above, yet the need still exists.

The congregation located in La Esperanza (the more expensive area) is growing faster. The church is now meeting in a tent on the property rented for the local preacher’s house, offering little protection from the weather. The congregation in Villa San Francisco had to re-locate because of rent increase.

Both of these congregations could benefit from having their own buildings. The challenge comes in finding money to build them. Do you think that maybe you are the answer to that part of their prayers? You may not do all, but portions do add up. Proverbs 21:13 states, “Whoever shuts his ears to the cry of the poor will also cry himself and not be heard.” Let’s work together and help these congregations in need.

Stretching Your Mission Dollars

THE APOSTLE PAUL STATED, “I know how to be abased, and I know also how to abound: in everything and in all things have I learned the secret both to be filled and to be hungry, both to abound and to be in want.” (Philippians 4:12) In verse thirteen he explained how he did this: “I can do all things in him that strengtheneth me.”

It goes without saying that most of us are feeling the economic crunch in our country. Times are tough. However, during these difficult times we must trust in the Lord to help us through. There was more to Paul’s success “in everything” than just trusting the Lord to take care of him. In context, Paul is discussing how to make it through “affliction” on what the church in Philippi had given him for his work (Cf. vs. 14-16). He humbly accepted what he had received and made his “mission money” go as far as possible.

Latin American Missions also has to operate with what we have been blessed. Although we were already seeking to be frugal, we are taking further steps to do so.

TRAVEL: Within the United States, due to the cost of gasoline, motels and eating on the road, we have cut back on personal visits to supporters. Our international travel has also been cut back. We are going, but only when necessary, and doing all we can while there.

COMMUNICATIONS: Today, we have several tools available for Internet video conferencing and voice calls. This ability allows us to sit at our computers in Valdosta and see and talk with our brethren throughout Latin America. These tools save hundreds of dollars and are not bound by international borders. Computer to computer calling is free, while calls to the local phones numbers of our preachers and teachers can be as little as three cents a minute.

Electronic Mail, or EMAIL, has taken the place of many expensive phone calls and also cuts cost on postage and paper for mailing. This newsletter is also available on our website.

We are sensitive to your struggles, and want you to know, as Paul wanted the Philippians to know, that we are trying to do the best we can with your financial gifts, and at the same time keeping the work of the Lord going.
